
U.S. DHHS Overview <http://www.hhs.gov/>

HHS is the principal Federal department charged with protecting the health of all Americans and providing essential human services. The Budget prioritizes core services and programs and makes targeted investments in training and support of health care providers, innovative biomedical research, food and drug safety, mental health services, health care for American Indians and Alaska natives, early childhood programs, and services for other vulnerable populations.



The President’s FY 2017 Budget provides \$82.8 billion in discretionary funding for the Department of Health and Human Services to continue and to expand critical investments that protect the health and wellbeing of the American people. U.S. DHHS is the largest grant-making in the federal government, providing some 60,000 grants per year. HHS’ Medicare program is the nation’s largest health insurer, handling more than 900 million claims per year.

For each resource, the parent DHHS agency noted following the resource title (the resource may be several divisions/departments into the agency, however for simplicity, only the overall parent agency is noted, i.e. the agencies appearing on the DHHS organizational chart on page 1). The exception to this is that resources that are housed within HRSA's Maternal and Child Health Bureau indicate " / MCHB / HRSA" so that state adolescent health coordinators funded by/within HRSA/MCHB administered state Title V/Maternal and Child Health Blockgrant programs have a quick reference guide to other MCHB funded initiatives.

Although this list is not all-inclusive of the many places in federal government where health issues affecting adolescents are addressed, it certainly demonstrates the extensive array of federally funded efforts addressing critical adolescent health issues.
